Military Records in 2005

Happy 2005 to everyone!!! We are now starting the eighth year of our little LST534 newsletter. Can you believe it??

As we think about the New Year, it is a good time to create a goal—one that we can accomplish. That goal would be getting all of your medals you are due. Below is a list of names, addresses and in some cases, information about how to apply for and claim such medals.

Before you apply for any medals, you must have your **military records**, including discharge papers.

A good website to visit for all of you with internet access is:

www.archives.gov

You can search Personnel Records from there. The National Personnel Records Center, Military Personnel Records (NPRC-MPR) is the repository of millions of military personnel, health, and medical records of discharged and deceased veterans of all services during the 20th century.

If you are a veteran or next-of-

kin of a deceased veteran, you may now use www.vetrecs.archives.gov to order a copy of your Standard Form 180. It includes complete instructions for preparing and submitting requests.

COMBAT ACTION RIBBONS:

Navy and Marine Corps veterans who served in combat during or after WWII are now eligible to receive the Combat Action Ribbon (CAR). When Richard Danzig was Secretary of the Navy, he authorized this award for those who served in combat but never received a ribbon.

In order to be eligible for the CAR, veterans must have participated in ground or surface combat after December 6, 1941 but before March 1, 1961, and you must not have already have been recognized for the same participation.

Under Public Law 106-65, the Fiscal Year 2000 Defense Authorization Act, the Secretary of the Navy can award the CAR to veterans retroactively. The time period required for submission is being waived in all cases. Two blocks of time have been designated for eligibility of the CAR, WWII: December 7, 1941—April 14, 1946, and Korea: June 27, 1950—July 27, 1954. The following information must be provided: Standard Form 180 Request Pertaining to

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Military Records, or cover letter with the following information: full name, SSN, service number (if applicable), period of eligibility, combat unit assigned at the time, complete dates (from/to) associated with assignments to the combat unit, and mailing address. Copy of Naval Personnel For 553 or Defense Department (DD) Form 214, D-215 (if applicable). Additional substantiating documentation (optional): copies of combat awards substantiating ground or surface combat; muster sheets or orders showing assignment to the unit for the period requested. If documentation is not available showing time served in combat unit, specify dates in your correspondence.

WHO WAS ST. PATRICK?

The person who was to become St. Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland, was born in Wales about AD 385. His given name was Maewyn, and almost didn't become bishop of Ireland because he lacked the required scholarship.

Far from being a saint, until he was 16, he considered himself a pagan. At that age, he was sold into slavery by a group of Irish marauders that raided his village. During his captivity, he became closer to God.

He escaped from slavery after six years and went to Gaul where he studied in the monastery under St. Germain, bishop of Auxerre for twelve years. During his training he became aware that his calling was to convert the pagans to Christianity.

His wishes were to return to Ireland, to convert the native pagans to Christianity. Patrick,

having adopted that Christian name, was appointed as bishop to Ireland.

Patrick was quite successful at winning converts. He traveled throughout Ireland, establishing monasteries across the country. He also set up schools and churches which would aid him in his conversion of the Irish country to Christianity.

His mission in Ireland lasted for thirty years. After that time, Patrick retired to County Down. He died on March 17 in AD 461.

That day has been commemorated as St. Patrick's Day since.

Much Irish folklore surrounds St. Patrick's Day. Not much of it is actually substantiated. Some of this lore includes the belief that Patrick raised people from the dead. Though originally a Catholic holy day, St. Patrick's Day has evolved into more of a secular holiday.

One traditional icon of the day is the shamrock which stems from a more bona fide Irish tale that tells how Patrick used the three-leafed shamrock to explain the Trinity. He used it in his sermons to represent how the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit could all exist as separate elements of the same entity. His followers adopted the custom of wearing a shamrock on his feast day.

The St. Patrick's Day custom came to America in 1737. That

was the first year St. Patrick's Day was publicly celebrated in this country, in Boston.


