Recognizing a Stroke

Sometimes symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness spells disaster. The stroke victim may suffer severe brain damage when people nearby fail to recognize the symptoms of a stroke.

Now doctors say a bystander can recognize a stroke by asking three simple questions:

- **\$** Ask the individual to **\$mile**
- T Ask the person to Talk in simple sentences
- R Ask him or her to
 Raise Both Arms

Another sign of a stroke:

Ask the person to stick out their tongue. If the tongue is crooked (goes to one side or the other), this is an indication of a stroke.

If he or she has trouble with **ANY ONE** of these tasks, call 911 immediately and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher.

A neurologist says that if he can get to a stroke victim within three hours he can totally reverse the effects of a stroke...totally. He said the trick was getting a stroke recognized, diagnosed, and then getting the patient medically cared for within three hours.


