Onto Rugged Shores: Voyage of LST534 A Model for Classroom Study

It is with extreme pride that I tell you about what is happening with our little documentary on the voyage of LST534. The entire show is now online, on the Internet, and is being used as a lesson plan for high school students. I have always believed one of the greatest gifts one can give is to teach someone else something, anything. But that is where you can really make an impact. Think about the impact we are making on high school students today!

The Museum of Broadcast Communications Education Department contacted me about 6 months ago to get permission to use the tape in their history lessons online.

I immediately signed the release with a smile because I assumed they might use one clip, or segment. I vowed to check it out sometime and see what they used. Well, to my surprise and utter thrill, I am reproducing for you now, just what they did.

Learning Objective:

- Students will gain understanding of World War
- Students will gain appreciation for the seamen who fought the war on the water
- Students will see the marks left by war in the veterans.
- Students will learn the lasting effects of war.

Background Information: The LST534 was one of the nation's most famous and powerful warships. It is one of 1,000 warships used in World War II. Preservation of the ships has been nonexistent, thus memories of the seamen are historically valuable.

The LST534 combed the shores of Normandy to Okinawa. It weathered typhoons, submarine attacks and air warfare. The great-grandfather of battleships sustained its final blow on November 2, 1945. All men were transferred or discharged.

Documentary Summary: documentary takes a close look at one of the greatest warships of all time – the LST534. The flatbottomed boat rolled into many enemy beaches during World War II with 119 American naval soldiers. This documentary tells the story of the LST534 with the voices of those who were assigned to military duty on the infamous vessel. The film chronicles the history of the ship as well as personal remembrances of naval seamen on the ship. Film clips of World War II are spliced into sequences of war commentary by Howard K. Smith.

Talk Show:

Select 6 of the veterans from the LST534. Match each with a student. Select a host. After students have researched the LST534, have them produce their own talk show focusing on the LST534.


